COMM1010: Communication at Work (3 semester credits)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Sophia's Art History I course helps you master the fundamentals of art history from prehistoric times to the Renaissance. In this course, you will explore art exhibits, analyze buildings and architecture, and examine art in everyday life.

Prerequisite(s): No prerequisites

Length of course: This is a self-paced course. Students have 60 days with an additional 30-day extension (if needed) to complete the course.
