ENG1001: English Composition I

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course helps the students to learn the core skills of English Composition and how to apply those skills to become effective writers. Students will gain proficiency with all of the steps in the writing process while creating and revising original narrative, comparison/contrast, informative, and argumentative compositions. Students in this course will learn how to analyze the rhetorical situation of a text or their own compositions. Upon completion of this course, students will be able to create a well-structured draft and employ strategies for meaningful revision to produce a clear and cohesive composition.

Course Effective Dates: June 2018 - March 31, 2021

Prerequisite(s): Lower-division baccalaureate/associate degree course – no prerequisites

Length of course: This is a self-paced course. Students have 60 days with an additional 30 day extension (if needed) to complete the course.

GRADING

This is a pass/fail course. Students are required to complete all 15 formative assessments, 5 summative assessments, and 5 writing assignments with an overall course average of 70% or better.
